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Parent Grant Ideas



• Picture us Dancing

Sessions of multi-cultural dances followed by sessions of scrapbook making (photojournalism)

• Murals

Students create murals made with paper mosaic tiles or paint or multi-media.

• Quilt Making

Students will create a school quilt based upon a theme. During the process they will learn about quilt history, the mathematics involved in quilt making, the art of cooperation, and be involved in the "dedication" of their quilt.

• Dance Around the World (Chinese, African/American, Classical Indian, American Social, Latin)

Creative movement is instrumental in finding the commonality amongst students and parents, as dance is used as a universal language. Folk Dances of the World celebrates the cultural heritage of many groups, as the participants share dances from their native countries.

• Celebrate who or what your school is named after. Celebrate the history of the name of your school with a mural, quilt, theatrical production, etc.

• Books from Around the World

Books can be made of pages that are tied together, strung on strings, folded, rolled, and sewn in different ways. Today we use paper to make books but when people first started writing, there was no paper. They used whatever materials they could find around them- wood, leaves, clay, cloth, bark, metal, and animal skin. The way the pages were put together depended on the material being used. Students and parents will make books from a variety of cultures: Slat Books (China), Leaf Books (India), Scroll Books (Africa), Accordion Books (Mexico), Sewn Books (Korea, Viet Nam).

• The Play's the Thing

As an extension of your Project ARTS program whereby students are involved in a play production (ranging from Shakespeare to Broadway) the parents participate too.

• All that Jazz (aka: Cotton Club @ ...) Celebrate the Harlem Renaissance

• Hispanic Tales and Tunes

Stories and songs in English (with some Spanish) to positively heighten awareness of the Spanish culture.

• Songs of Peace and Love

Multicultural songs that celebrate world peace and harmony.

• Photojournalism

Students will learn the art of photography (composition, framing, lighting techniques) and will create hand made books which will include journal entries about their pictures. The culminating event will be a Publishing Party.

• BAM - Big American Moments

Study a period of American History through song and/or dance.

Heads and Tales

Mask making and storytelling that culminates with a performance.

• Puppetry

Puppet making and drama that culminates with a performance.

• Soft Sculptures Pillows

Reading is Fundamental (RIF) and everyone should feel relaxed and comfortable when they read. Students and parents will make fun life-size soft sculpture pillows. Their pillows will literally takes on a personality of their own. The sculptures are of characters created by manipulating fabric into a 3-dimensional shape with binding and filling.

• Everything Aesop

Students and parents will come to enjoy Aesop fables and then they will adapt a favorite fable to contemporary times. In each adaptation of an Aesop's fable they will create their own "cast of characters" to represent the situation and focus upon the morale of the story. Each family will create an illustrated book of their fable which they will share with the other participants.

- American Celebration (Songs)
 Selections from the 365 "Songs of the Century," as compiled by the Recording Industry of America and the National Endowment for the Arts
- African-American Culture

Explore the rich heritage of African Americans through art, music, and literature. Let the voices of the past speak to our students in a way that will give them a deeper appreciation for African-American culture.

• In the "Kid"chen

Students and parents will learn the importance of healthy cooking and eating. The participants will cook healthy and fun foods. Each family will create a "keepsake" recipe book.

• How does your Garden Grow?

Plan and plant an indoor and/or outdoor garden or habitat. Parents and students will become gardeners. They will also write, illustrate a journal of the natural world. Constructing a garden is a wonderful project that can involve the school and community. Beautifying the school grounds fosters pride, teaches the participants about the environment, and creates a lasting legacy. You'll be sowing the seeds for growing, inquiring minds.

• Go Fly a Kite

How does a kite fly? What are the traditions and stories about kites? Benjamin Franklin didn't fl y the first kite; the Chinese did. After its appearance in China, the kite migrated to Japan, Korea, Myanmar (Burma), India, Arabia, and North Africa, then farther south into the Malay Peninsula, Indonesia, and the islands of Oceania as far east as Easter Island. Of course students and parents will make and fly their kites.

• Around the World via Broadway - Vocal Music and/or Dance The participants will "journey" around the world as they learn songs and/or dances from Broadway shows.

• Make Your Own Instruments

The participants will make instruments such as drums, maracas horns, rubber band guitar, shakers, tambourine, rain sticks, thumb piano (mbira). They will learn how sounds are created, gain concrete experience with music fundamentals, and use math and measurement skills. In addition, they will learn songs and accompany themselves with the instruments.

• Ventures in Video

Participants will work in a group and write their own script based upon a theme (such as family, community, cultural heritage, social issue, etc.). They will use at least one additional arts form (dance, visual arts, music) in preparing their segment. Each group will create a final video on DVD.

Talking Books

A program that "gives voice" to book characters. Students and parents write scripts focusing upon themes, plot development, conflict, and conflict resolution. Everyone will have the opportunity to tap into their own creativity, imagination and fantasy as they engage in making books talk.
